COVID 19 update: The August 27, 2020 Public Disclosure Commission Meeting was streamed live at https://www.youtube.com/user/WASTPDC/live.

The August commission meeting was held remotely pursuant to the Governor's Emergency Proclamation 20-28 regarding Covid-19, waiving in-person meeting and access requirements.

Chair Opening Comments | PDC Meeting Video

Chair Ammons commended his fellow Commissioners and PDC staff for their diligence and commitment to move forward despite the impediments involving Covid-19.

Although the Commission has no intent on requesting a policy bill this session, the Chair stated it would watch for any potential legislation it may want to comment on, as well as make the case for retaining the capacity of the agency and for additional authorization for IT projects.

Chair Ammons discussed moving forward with scheduling a strategic planning meeting. The original planning of the annual April strategic planning meeting was canceled due to Covid-19. The Commission agreed that while an in-person meeting is desirable, an online meeting is practical with the current pandemic situation. It will meet via Teams October 15, 2020.

Director Lavallee spoke on the current remote work situation involving PDC staff and the possibilities of when a reopening could occur, however due to health and safety concerns for not only staff but the community as well the PDC will continue to work almost exclusively remotely. He noted the oncea-month furloughs for PDC staff and discussions the executive team have had on what a staggered reopening of the offices could entail.

Executive Director Lavallee and the Commission discussed the complexity of the case, what it could mean to the PDC, and what methods of action could be considered. Executive Director Lavallee updated the Commission on the current budget situation and how staff continue to work diligently with OFM and the Legislature in making the argument that if PDC funding is cut, the detriment it would be to the agency; as well as how gaps could be potentially filled from the 22W Transparency Fund if the agency is forced to take cuts.

Chad Johnson, Senior Financial Consultant (DES), talked about the 21 - 23 biennium submissions for OFM and the potential impact of a \$1,000,683 cut. He noted the prior fiscal year had ended with the agency being underspent by \$100,047.
